I'd like to highlight an OOTSP person each month as I discover them as I do my visiting of Otterbein UMC members who can no longer attend church. Here's one:

# **Maxine Perry**

I have visited with her in her duplex house near Sentara RMH. I have given her flowers and she loved that. I asked her if she knew Carolyn Stroop in Bellaire Retirement Community and she said yes and many others in the church. She said she was doing well for 91 years old and she hasn't needed a doctor appointment for a long time.

Maxine was born and raised in Rockingham County. Her family lived in Singer's Glen and she went to Sunday School and church there every Sunday. She was in the youth fellowship and choir as a teenager. She said that she didn't sing much, but she and her girlfriend whispered and giggled a lot. She went forward to the altar at 12 years old and accepted Christ as her Savior.

She moved to Harrisonburg and joined the Brethren Church (now Otterbein United Methodist Church). She was active in church and the women's group. She remembers going Christmas caroling with the church and carolers came to her house once. She worked at the Mick-or-Mack Grocery Store (near Court Square) for 30 years. Customers would form a line at her register even when other registers were empty. She had two sons, Dennis and Carl (who passed away). Dennis was a United Methodist pastor in Richmond for 30 years. He now pastors a United Methodist Church in Elkton, Maryland, where young couples used to go when they eloped to get married. She has two grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Her family keeps in touch and visits when they can.

She feels bad about not being able to get to church, but her walking is limited. If you remember Maxine (or not) pay her a visit or a call or a card. She is truly One Of The Sweetest People!

As our December *Tidings* is being prepared, we are also working on our annual Advent devotionals. During my appointment at Glossbrenner, we started writing Advent devotionals as a community. The four local congregations worked cooperatively to compile a devotion for each day. I simply borrowed the idea from what I had experienced at Otterbein when I attended before entering into ministry. To keep everyone from writing about Christmas, we gave everyone a set of daily lectionary texts to work with. That practice continues to this day. It is also where I hear the most comments about having to write devotionals for Advent. Our spirits yearn from Christmas and we expect to be writing about those narratives during the season of Advent. Instead, the texts remind us that Advent is about preparation. Preparation for the celebration of Jesus' birth and preparation for his pending return. Sometimes they are hard to work with and not as celebratory as we might like. This is working as intended. While all of us are blessed by the practice of devotional reading, the writer is doubly blessed in having to study and sit with a potentially unfamiliar text. Working through how it speaks to them, what message it might have for others and what connection is has to the work of preparing for Christmas is a significant task. This is a great way to deepen our discipleship and grow in our faith. I know at times the content is hard; I am challenged when I write these devotionals as well, but in our faith, we are capable of doing hard things from continued next page... time to time. I love reading your devotions because I know that it is a place where you have had an opportunity to grow in your faith and share that evidence with others. I'm tempted for us to add the Christmas season to the Advent devotionals; we have more than enough able writers to cover the extra twelve days and then you would get the opportunity to write about Christmas in addition to Advent. I imagine that the challenge would not lessen, but maybe the spirit of the work would be a little more joyful.

I hope you are having a great season of preparation during Advent and may blessings abound during Christmas.



# Macedonian Baked Drumstick Recipe

Although this is not the exact recipe given to the team, it's the closest to their directions of "some garlic powder, some onion powder, salt, etc." This is the recipe for the drumsticks served at our potluck earlier this year.

For 8 drumsticks - Bak at 400° for 35 - 45 minutes, depending on size of drumsticks

3/4 cups Olive Oil I t Paprika 2/3 cups Parsley Flakes I t Salt

It Garlic Powder It Pepper

I t Onion Powder

The sheepfold is a place of safety and protection with the shepherd serving as the gate. As Christians, we know that Jesus is the gate to salvation. Alongside the fence is a primitive wooden structure, an observation tower to better visualize the surroundings in an effort to further protect the flock. Likewise, we are never out of God's sight as he faithfully keeps watch over us.

While looking at the sheep, you will find the signature of "C. Day Rudy Co. Harrisburg, PA", creator and installer of the window. It is located in the far right panel under the largest sheep resting in the green grass.

There are many winged angels and other enhaloed figures at both the top and bottom portions of the window. Perhaps the four central figures that hold the scrolls with the words, "GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGHEST" may depict Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, since the four Gospel writers are often included in church windows.

Stained glass artisans sometimes add local landmarks to their works. Look closely at the bluish mountains in the background. One range has the familiar outline of the Massanutten Peak as if viewed from the east. It's unknown if this was intentional, but it made me think of the Magi who followed the star over Bethlehem as they journeyed from the East to visit and honor the newborn King. This placement in the window provides the proper orientation and direction of their travel.

I love art and where it can lead your thoughts and interpretations! I hope you will enjoy finding some of these seldom noticed elements. Perhaps you will come up with other interpretations.

# Hidden In Plain Sight—Part 2

This is a continuation of our look at the sanctuary window, Annunciation to the Shepherds. The bucolic scene of river, plants, and sheep provides a lovely picture in its own right, but let's look at the possible symbolic elements.

A winding river in the background of the landscape might suggest key Christian concepts associated with water: baptism, life, transformation, cleansing, and salvation. The many green bushes and trees represent life, growth, and rebirth, as well as beautifully illustrating the magnificence of God's creation.

The angels, bright and prominent in the sky, feature the largest angel holding a palm branch, an ancient Christian symbol of peace, victory, and eternal life. It's also a reminder of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem where crowds welcomed him by waving palm branches.

In Christian art, a shepherd's staff with its familiar crook often reflects Jesus' ministry and work of caring for the poor, weak, and vulnerable. As the hook could be used to retrieve sheep from precarious situations, so Christ is ever-present as our Good Shepherd.

Next to the shepherd dressed in red is a lone, centrally-placed sheep intently looking heavenward. A single lamb often symbolizes Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God. The image of that single lamb also brought to mind the parable of the lost sheep that has returned from its wandering and is now safe in the shepherd's care.

The remaining flock of sheep could easily represent the body of believers who belong to God and are loved by Christ. The sheep are protected by a rail fence which symbolizes divine protection.
