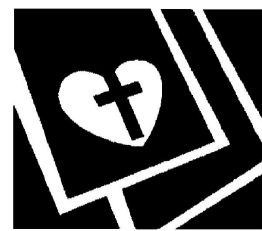
Married for 56 years, the Edlinds have been blessed with 5 children and 6 grandchildren. Their dog, Amos is also counted as a beloved member of the family.

FROM THE PASTOR

Happy New Year! What a joyous time Christmas is! We always make a big deal about waiting for Christmas during Advent and not rushing ahead; part of that reasoning is that when we do come to Christmas, it is special. Twelve days of celebration, food, family time, worship, and hopefully not a lot of bothersome things like work, sickness, or bad weather. (I'll let you define what "bad" weather is.)

While Christmas has taken on a good deal of commercial and non-sacred baggage of the years, at its heart it remains a time to acknowledge the birth of Jesus and the proclamation that God sent his son to dwell with us. Each of the gospel narratives of the birth have their own focus but I find the John 1 text to be the most meaningful. No camels, or shepherds, or angels, no gifts or mangers, or guiding stars, but instead a simple statement of our faith. At the end of the passage it uses the phrase, "*and the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us*" John 1:14. This simple statement summarizes Christmas for me. It connects to John 3:16, God loved us so much he took on human form and walked along with us for a while. John also tells us that even as Jesus is leaving, the Holy Spirit will remain with us. We are a people who God has chosen to be with throughout the journey of our life. Christmas is that reminder. I like the John text, but the stories in Luke and Matthew say the same thing in different form. God will be with us in a tangible real way. Jesus present, as a baby, knowing what it's like to be alive and face the same things we face. This is Christmas.

I hope you are enjoying this Christmas season and in some way being reminded that God continues to be with us. Merry Christmas!

The City's Gray Squirrels

If you have trees in your neighborhood, you probably

have gray squirrels scampering around. There are over 246 species of squirrels and they are one of the largest families of rodents (gnawing animals).

If you have had to brake for a squirrel running across the street or repair a building they have chewed with their chisel-like front teeth, you might consider them a nuisance and destructive. In our house, we call them fascinating to watch and one of God's creations.

We have an undeveloped wooded area behind our house and when my son began feeding the birds several years ago, squirrels came for breakfast with the birds. Watching the squirrels play was so fascinating that he began adding more birdfeed, suet, and peanuts. The squirrels have their own feeders now and we have between eight and fifteen squirrels gathering daily. The first snow in December brought around twenty.

The gestation period of a gray squirrel is 44 days and they have 2-5 young. At 5 to 8 weeks, the young have fur and begin searching for their own food. They start having their own families at about a year old. They live two to six years in the wild and up to 15 years in captivity.

Squirrels eat corn, seeds, pinecones, berries, nuts, and bird food. They especially love Costco's peanuts. We discovered they like pumpkins

when they ate the neighborhood's pumpkin decors last year, so now we add pumpkins to their fall food purchases. In autumn, squirrels hunt and hide food for winter. They may forget where they hide their nuts and in time, these nuts sprout and become young trees.

They also drink plenty of water.

Squirrels are more active in the mornings and evenings. They use their tails for shade from the sun, as an umbrella when it rains, to balance them when jumping from tree to tree, and as a blanket in their nest on cool nights.

They have two homes. A cool temporary summer one made loosely with twigs and leaves and may fall apart, causing them to rebuild several times. The permanent nest may be a hollow tree or layers of twigs and leaves packed firmly together to keep out rain, snow, and wind. In winter several may share the same nest to keep warm. In cold weather, they may undergo periods of dormancy, but wake every few days for food.

Their enemies include bobcats, cats, coyotes, dogs, foxes, owls, and humans (their greatest enemy), who hunt them for sport, meat, and fur. But no hunting in the city.

To watch the squirrels hunched, eating peanuts or chasing each other as they play or fight for food, is truly a picture to behold. Our backyard is a safe haven for any creature that wonders in. "All things bright and beautiful. All creatures great and small. All things wise and wonderful, the Lord God made them all."
